COMMUNITY COLLEGE STEP MECHANICS

- STEP = SNAP Training Employment Program, Oregon's SNAP 50/50
- Careful and intentional allocation of college resources, to create new, expanded or enhanced services that can increase college access and success for SNAP recipients and lead to living wage careers
- Colleges utilizing skills-based approach—increasing college access and completion, career pathway advancement, and connection to living wage careers
- Reimbursement is reinvested back into the program, providing key staffing and support services for students (tuition, fees, books, tools, transportation, etc.)

A Career Pathway is a series of connected, high quality education and training programs with integrated student support services that enables individuals to secure a job and advance in an industry or occupation.

Career Pathways are an equity strategy that increase college access, retention, and completion.

Supports individual's progression along the education and career continuum = college completion and career advancement

Eases student transitions: K-12 - GED/ESL/pre-college-community college-university-workforce

Offers short-term stackable credentials leading to in-demand occupations and degrees

Integrates student support services = wrap-around college success and career coaching

Responds to sector strategies, employer partnerships, and industry demand

RETURN ON INVESTMENT



- With continued baseline funding and reinvestment, Oregon community colleges could see
 STEP grow from \$5.065 million to \$13.44 million in 2 biennia
- This same approach to investing resources could bring in \$39 million in federal funding to all 17 of Oregon's community colleges between FY 19 and FY25
- Opportunity for increased publicprivate and local partnerships
- Source of new enrollments and FTE for college

HIGHLIGHTS AND OPPORTUNITIES

- Policy changes responsive to student hunger
- All 17 community colleges will be part of STEP Consortia in FFY 20
- Systemic approach to braiding together of resources
- Utilizing proven strategies and model to increase equity and close opportunity gaps for students of color, women, immigrants, adult education and underserved students.
- Statewide Pathways to Opportunity initiative scaling up work




