Roosevelt	<b>Defining High-Quality Work-Based Learning</b> What does "high-quality" mean in work-based learning? How can states define and measure high-quality work-based learning to support worker and employer success? This session will help attendees identify components of "high-quality" work-based learning and how these components can lead to better outcomes for workers and employers. The session will first provide a framework for understanding high-quality work-based learning. Attendees will then hear from state representatives who have defined and encouraged high-quality work-based learning. The session will conclude with an exercise to help attendees define high-quality work-based learning for their state.
