20% occupy the fourth quintile




20% occupy the middle quintile








Mobility in America

= 1% of households








20% occupy the bottom quintile ³

Mobility in America






19% move to middle quintile

23% move to second quintile








42% stay in bottom quintile4

Children of Mothers with Depression










67% drop in parenting stress





Huge Effects in Families' Lives



Part-time employment more than doubles


