




Stronger Systems, Stronger Youth: 2023-2028






Children's Cabinet Network



Funding

- In most states there are legislated appropriations for the staffing and operation of the children's cabinet:
 - As part of the Governor's executive budget,
 - A special fund established for the purpose of administering the cabinet; or
 - To an agency as the fiscal agent for the cabinet.
- Examples:
 - Louisiana
 - New Mexico




Strategic Planning



- Most of the Governor's cabinets have a strategic plan.
- Across all coordinating bodies, strategic plans vary in the level of detail and planning.

Created a layered governance across 22 state agencies to center children and equity, and led advancements in cross-agency work in Minnesota priorities.

Shared Governance

The Governor's Children's Cabinet, co-chaired by the Governor and Lt. Governor, consists of 10 agencies listed in statute and 12 additional agencies that meet quarterly. Since launching in August 2019, the Children's Cabinet created a new shared governance structure through cross-agency coordination while centering children in our state systems. The Children's Cabinet convened the following groups:

- ► The Senior Leadership Team, consisting of deputy and assistant commissioners (quarterly)
- ► The Interagency Leadership Team, comprised of division directors and leaders of agency programs (monthly)
- Fig. 124D.141) and the Children's Cabinet Advisory Council, which joined forces to advise and create

The Children's Cabinet established key priorities covering the full gamut of basic child, youth, and family needs and led the following action teams of agency leaders to drive progress for children in the following areas

- ► Healthy Beginnings: ensuring all children get off to a healthy start
- Mental Health and Well-being: fostering children's emotional as well as physical
- ► Child Care and Early Education: coordinating child care and early education, including expanding child care capacity
- ► Housing Stability: supporting children, youth, and families with safe, reliable
- Educational Opportunity: providing every child access to quality education, no matter their race or zip code
- Food security: strengthening the emergency food system and working to eliminate child hunge
- ▶ Out-of-School Time: promoting supports for older youth when not in school
- ➤ Youth Justice: supporting children and families who are currently or previously systems involved, creating governance that dismantles the pipelines that lead to youth systems involvement

In 2021, the Children's Cabinet convened the legislatively directed Great Start for All Minnesota Children Task Force, which met monthly and, in February 2023, delivered its final report and implementation timeline for improving Minnesota's early care and

Proclamations

The Children's Cabinet worked in partnership with agencies around priority proclamations that were issued by Governor Walz, bringing attention to important children and family-related matters:

- ▶ I Love to Read Month was celebrated by both a proclamation and a visit from the Governor to a school

- ► Children's Mental Health Week
- ► Count all Kids Day

Highlights

Led cross-agency Governor's budget development process resulting in a historic \$5.1 billion 2022 supplemental budget

Worked with the Departments of Education (MDE) and Human Services (DHS) to advance Medicaid Direct Certification with school meal resulting in an estimated 90,000 additional students automatically

No Kid Hungry to advance food access for indigenous students in schools, a program the Minnesota Department of Education plans to launch this coming school year accessing free meals

Publications

The Children's Cabinet published and collaborated with partners on many resources for community member and families:

- ▶ Released an enterprise-wide children's fiscal map of state expenditures on children, trained advocates on how to use the data, and built a process for it to be updated for years to come;
- ▶ In partnership with the Minnesota Business Vitality Council, issued a report on child care, its role in the economy, and the importance of business partnerships;
- Issued the Early Childhood Governance Report and continued cross-agency shared governance efforts to better coordinate state systems:
- Published a quarterly Parent and Family Resource Guide in multiple languages, containing resources from nearly all of the Children's Cabinet agencies to provide tools to organizations and families during the height
 - Created a first-ever newsletter to members of the public, sharing cross-agency efforts focused on children and families:
 - ► Collaborated with the Minnesota Department of Education and the Greater Twin Cities United Way to create the "Stu211" push text messaging campaign to connect students and families to academic, career, health, food, and housing resources in their communities; and
 - ▶ Built and maintained multiple online resources, including an informational website about the work of the Children's Cabinet, child care provider updates during the COVID-19 pandemic, and a one-stop website with information and in-state resources for child care and early education for providers, families, and communities.

Public Engagement

The Children's Cabinet engaged with community partners and agency partners through many events, including:

- Inaugural Children's Cabinet convening at Rochester High School, August 2019;
- Informational calls and visits to child care providers to highlight their needs during
- ► Great Start for All Minnesota Children Listening Sessions, quarterly in 2022;
- In partnership with MDH and DHS hosted a four-day virtual Children's Summit on Mental Health where over 1,000 members of the public identified barriers and solutions for issues facing the state's behavioral health system for youth, January 2022;
- Supported the Black Maternal Health Caucus Roundtable Event, April 2022;
- Launched the Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights in August 2022, with the goal of increasing access to the outdoors for all children and families;
- Presented at several Mind, Body, and Soul Convenings, a series of work sessions hosted by several state agencies focused on African Americans in Minnesota, Fall 2022;
- Together with DHS and MDE, announced a \$3 million investment in children's mental health at St. David's Center for Child and Family Development in October 2022;
- · Provided keynote remarks at the NGA's Chair's Initiative on Strengthening Youth Mental Health, October 2022; and
- Represented MN State Government at the National Governor's Association (NGA) Roundtable on COVID-19 and Maternal and


